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

The Century is thrilled to announce the opening of an exhibition featuring the Ravarino Collection, a renowned and debated selection of works attributed to Francis Bacon. The exhibition will be displayed in the Century's club lounge, a members-only space, but it will be open to the public by special appointment Tuesday evenings. Art pieces will be available for purchase. This exhibition will be held shortly before the National Portrait Gallery's exhibition, Francis Bacon: Human Presence.

Francis Bacon, one of the most influential artists of the 20th century, is renowned for his unsettling images of





The Ravarino Collection first came to public attention in 1994 and has since been exhibited extensively in Italy, the UK, Europe, China, and Argentina. However, the collection has not been without controversy. Two questions dominate: whether Bacon ever really drew, and if he did whether he created the Ravarino Collection.

Bacon's assertion that he painted fully-formed images straight to canvas has long been a part of his artistic mythos. Yet, evidence has surfaced since 1992 suggesting that Bacon did, in fact, engage in drawing, both as preparation for his paintings and as standalone works given to friends. Notably, art critic David Sylvester, a close associate of Bacon, shifted his opinion to acknowledge the possibility of Bacon's drawing practice.

Despite significant circumstantial, expert, and legal evidence supporting the authenticity of the Ravarino Collection, the Francis Bacon Estate has steadfastly refused to authenticate the works, even labeling them as forgeries in a UK court. Nevertheless, Ravarino has been acquitted of counterfeiting charges, and other legal cases have been dismissed before reaching trial.



The Century is proud to exhibit a selection of these raw and unsettling works. The collection continues to divide opinion and as a result we can't say definitively that these works are by Francis Bacon, just that they are attributed to him. We nonetheless believe the evidence is compelling, and we invite you to view the works and decide for yourselves.
